Construction Curious about what's

happening behind the fence surrounding the future Pollinator and Bird Garden? Construction is well underway. and here are some of the developments we expect over the course of the coming months. Right now, site utilities and foundations are being installed.

As soon as February and March, features such as trellises and arbors will begin taking shape. By April and May, the site will begin looking much more like a garden, as sidewalks, water features, and the Bird House pavilion are installed. Final soil work will take place in June and July, and will be followed by tree and shrub planting. By August, we'll be ready for herbaceous perennials – and





The Arboretum is lucky to have Santa and Mrs. Claus (who bear a striking resemblance to volunteers Rich and Karen Hirsch) as the



may be eager for their visit or may hang back shyly until they are offered a chance to touch the soft trim on Santa's velvet sleeve. Older children


